KEY DEFINITIONS (Dictionary.com)

Steward

- 1. a person who manages another's property or financial affairs; one who administers anything as the agent of another or others
- 2. a person who has charge of the household of another, buying or obtaining food, directing the servants, etc.

Vocation

- 1. a particular occupation, business, or profession; calling
- 2. a strong impulse or inclination to follow a particular activity or career
- 3. a divine call to God's service or to the Christian life
- 4. a function or station in life to which one is called by God: *the religious vocation; the vocation of marriage*

As noted above, vocation means "calling." Consider what God's Word says about being called in the following passages:

Duty

Duty isn't always highly regarded. In other times, places, and contexts, duty was and is honorable and important. Consider the following:

Love

VOCATIONAL STEWARDSHIP
IN CONTEXT
Luther on the Three Estates



We know that there are three estates in this life: the household, the state, and the church. If all men want to neglect these and pursue their own interests and self-chosen ways, who will be a shepherd of souls? Who will baptize, absolve, and console those who are burdened with sins? Who will administer the government or protect the common fabric of human society? Who will educate the young or till the ground?

Above these three institutions and orders is the common order of Christian love, in which one serves not only the three orders, but also serves every needy person in general with all kinds of benevolent deeds, such as feeding the hungry, giving drink to the thirsty, forgiving enemies, praying for all men on earth, suffering all kinds of evil on earth, etc. Behold, these are called good and holy works. But none of these orders is a means of salvation. There remains only one way above them all, viz. faith in Jesus Christ.

THE CHURCH

A community of believers gathered around the pure proclamation of the Gospel and the right administration of the Sacraments. (See *Luther's Small Catechism with Explanation*, Q. 212; also Gen. 1:27-31)

CASE STUDY

Acts 6:1-7: Called to Serve

You may already be familiar with this story in Acts because it introduces Stephen, the first martyr. The story is also useful, though, for what it tells us about vocational stewardship in the church.

Consider the following questions:

- Why were the seven chosen for this work?
- Why did the twelve disciples think these seven were needed?
- Consider the job that the seven were called to do. What qualifications were they supposed to have? Why are these qualifications important?
 What are the implications for our own service in the church?
- What happens to the seven after they're chosen? (Acts 6:6) Why?

ELSEWHERE IN SCRIPTURE...

As you think about stewardship in the church, consider what the Bible tells us in the following passages:

- 1 Cor. 12:12-31 ("all members ... are one body")
- Rom. 12:3-8; 1 Peter 4:8-11 (on love and service)

Serving Our Neighbors in Church, State, and Home Session 3: Serving Our Neighbors in the STATE



THE STATE (or "CITY") IN CONTEXT: Luther on the Three Estates

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The first government is that of the home, from which the people come; the second is that of the city, meaning the country, the people, princes and lords, which we call the secular government.

These embrace everything—children, property, money, animals, etc. The home must produce, whereas the city must guard, protect, and defend. Then follows the third, God's own home and city, that is, the church, which must obtain people from the home and protection and defense from the city.

These are the three hierarchies ordained by God, and we need no more; indeed, we have enough and more than enough to do in living aright and resisting the devil in these three.

DUAL DUTY: THE GOVERNED AND THOSE WHO GOVERN (Romans 13:1-4)

"Let every person be subject to the governing authorities. For there is no authority except from God, and those that exist have been instituted by God. ... Do what is good, and you will receive his approval, for he is God's servant for your good."

SELECTION OF LEADERS

God is in charge

- 1 Sam. 16:1-13: Saul has been rejected as king of Israel for rejecting the Word of the Lord (I Sam. 15:26). It's time for a new king. Why did God choose David? What criteria were important to Him?
- Is. 44:28: God uses a Persian king to accomplish
 His aims. "He is my shepherd, and he shall fulfill all
 my purpose."
- **Is. 10:5**: "Ah, Assyria, the rod of my anger; the staff in their hands is my fury!"

DUTIES OF CITIZENS/NEIGHBORS

As you think about stewardship in the state, consider what the Bible tells us about the duties of citizens in the following passages:

- 1 Tim. 2:1-2: "I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for all people, for kings and all who are in high positions."
- Titus 3:1-8: "Be submissive to rulers and authorities ... and ready for every good work."
- Matt. 25:31-40: "'As you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to me.'"

"THE HOME" IN CONTEXT
Luther on the Three Estates

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But the holy orders and true religious institutions established by God are these three: the office of priest, the estate of marriage, the civil government. ...

All fathers and mothers who regulate their household wisely and bring up their children to the service of God are engaged in pure holiness, in a holy work and a holy order. Similarly, when children and servants show obedience to their elders and masters, here too is pure holiness, and whoever is thus engaged is a living saint on earth.
