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COVID-19 UPDATE: Living with Hope

The following article, written by the Rev. Neil Buono, is the first in a series of pandemic-related wellness pieces offered by members of the Kansas District Church Worker Care Committee. Although church workers are the immediate audience, the advice offered can benefit all readers.

Once upon a time, in the land of Oz, a faithful young pastor awoke in the middle of the night in a cold sweat. In his dream he had imagined that like Dorothy in the story, he was being



taken aloft in a swirling maelstrom of a storm. He watched his life pass by him and then, when he came crashing to the ground in his dream, he awoke startled and disoriented. After several minutes he collected himself and then thought, "Well, at least I survived the tornado. I wonder if I'll survive this pandemic!"

He is not alone in wondering what will become of us. We know, by faith, ultimately what will become of us. But that's not really what's troubling today. It's the uncertainty of living. We know how to manage a tornado here in Kansas. How much experience do we have managing a virus? And not just any virus. This virus is an unknown. On a worldwide scale. Occurring in the context of a post-modern world where a standard against which to measure what is true about this is elusive. No wonder a tornado seems manageable.

Many of us church workers are experiencing the symptoms of traumatic stress, absent the trauma. Indifference. Apathy. Fatigue. Acting out. Hypervigilance. Anger. Anxiety. Impatience. Fear. One of the most helpful things to combat traumatic stress is community support, and we are living in the world of virtual community now. No wonder so many with responsibility for others are shutting down. It's too much uncertainty, too little trustworthy information, and too much stress. No wonder we're a mess! The pastor in the land of Oz longed for a tornado he could understand and contend with.

On top of it all, our people look to us for guidance and encouragement. Really, it's not so much answers they are looking for as examples for how to live with this situation. So here goes: My top 5 for managing our faithful selves in the midst of the pandemic.

- 1. **Embrace the uncertainty.** Honestly, it's the existential reality of life on this side of eternity. We've lost sight of that because we are 21st-century Americans who can control almost anything and who have most of everything. But the reality is that we control nothing, and we know that, but it's so easy when life is going well to forget that. We live by faith. Always. Remind yourself of that. Every day. Many times throughout the day.
- 2. Stick to routines that work and when a new routine is needed, develop one. It's easy to forget about self-care when stressed and traumatized. But it's self-care that enables us to regain our resilience. So do

those things that work for you and do those things consistently and regularly. The basics done well will carry the day. Here are some examples of self-care basics:

- a. Take medication daily as prescribed.
- b. Drink lots of water throughout the day.
- c. Exercise more days than not during the week.
- d. Eat healthy more days than not during the week.
- e. Set aside quiet time daily for prayer and meditation.
- f. Do something for yourself that recharges your emotional and spiritual battery.
- 3. Give yourself permission to be imperfect and to be without answers. Church workers are the leaders with answers. We don't have answers to a lot of this, but we do have the answer to what matters. So be comfortable letting others know more than you and be even more comfortable with others knowing a lot less than you. We are in uncertain times. Choose a course of action and let go of the need for it to be right. Make the best decision you can with the information you have. In Shawnee County, my reality check has been comparing the COVID-19 death count with the homicide count in the capital city. Believe it or not, they are running neck-and-neck. That helps me remember that while this pandemic is no laughing matter and deadly serious, there are other ongoing serious issues as well. What did our Lord say? Remember that there will be wars and rumors of wars until the end. And the apostle Paul said, these are but the birth pangs of the new creation.
- 4. **Stop and laugh from time to time at the beauty and humor of this fallen world.** It's still God's world. And it will be broken until He comes again, so find the beauty in it even though it's really a big mess right now. And remember it could be worse. What if we have no football this fall?!
- 5. Cherish and nourish the relationships you have and guard against the inevitable pull of isolation, which seems safe but is horribly perilous. We can endure anything if we can find purpose in it and if we can go through it with others.

Circling back to the pastor in the land of Oz, he recalled later that the heart of the Dorothy narrative was seeing old things in a new way. It's not so much the thing itself that's the problem. It's what we tell ourselves about it. Finding a new and creative way to see our world now is one way to remain healthy, hopeful and faithful. The One who called us is faithful. He will do it.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

One year ago, two 87-year-old members volunteered to represent our congregation at Kansas Wesleyan University's community fair. As pastor, I explained, "If you can find two Lutheran students, I'll start a college fellowship/Bible study group."

God works in wonderful ways! Dean and Betty not only found enough students for us to begin a college ministry, they have received new Christian friends into their lives. Betty's fresh-baked cookies are the springboard for a weekly feast of food, fellowship and Bible study, serving lifelong Lutherans and anyone else who wants to attend.



The Lord has enabled our congregation, with great joy, to walk side-by-side with college students through these critical, faith-challenging years.

When our students return to worship in August, our congregation will be filled with smiles, hugs and handshakes, as our friends in Christ, separated from us for five months, grace us with their energetic and joyful presence. Then, on Wednesday evenings, our home will be alive with the Spirit of Christ as His grace brings together a community of college-aged saints.

A few additional thoughts:

- **Pastors**, speak to your departing college students about attending an LCMS church in their college town. Ask for permission to share a cell-phone number with that church's pastor. (*See note below*.)
- Parents, pray for your son or daughter. Talk to them about how to walk into a church full of strangers. If possible, on the first Sunday your son or daughter is at college, attend church with them. Don't plan to spend the whole day with them. They have things to do and many new people to meet. Just meet them at church for one hour.
- **Students**, take the initiative. Go to church the first week you're away at college. Don't be shy. Introduce yourself to the pastor and others. Give the pastor your cell number. You will be blessed by being there, but through you God will bless that congregation.
- Receiving congregation, pray that God will open the door for you to meet and serve college students. Be
 prepared for college students to arrive in your town and to walk in the door on Sunday morning. Greet
 them. Get to know them. Invite them to join you for lunch after worship. Offer a college fellowship and
 Bible study with plenty of food. Most of all, enjoy!

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

Reopening Plans: Lutheran Schools

Last spring, our Kansas District Lutheran schools had to change course quickly after school buildings were closed and learning moved online. School leaders have used that experience, along with available guidelines, to make adjustments for the 2020-21 school year.



One of those adjustments has been determining a reopening date. Here's what the schedule looks like for our Kansas Lutheran schools:

St. Paul's, Cheney: Aug. 13 Zion, Independence: Aug. 14 St. Paul, Leavenworth: Aug. 17

St. John, Alma: Aug. 18

Bethany, Overland Park: Aug. 18

Faith, Derby: Aug. 19

Linn Lutheran School: Aug. 19

Christ, Overland Park: Aug. 19 Hope, Shawnee: Aug. 20 Trinity, Winfield: Aug. 24

Good Shepherd, Marysville: Aug. 26

Holy Cross, Wichita: Sept. 2 Trinity, Atchison: Sept. 2

Topeka Lutheran School: Sept. 3

School leaders have prepared for reopening by taking necessary steps to create a safe and comfortable learning environment for all students. Their plans, which incorporate guidelines adopted by the Kansas State Department of Education, reflect a combination of local health guidelines and an understanding of what is practical and achievable daily with grade school children.

Adaptations include the use of common spaces, management of classroom transitions, and set-up of classroom spaces. Student desks have been repositioned to provide additional space between students throughout the day. Students are being invited to bring their own reusable water bottle to avoid using communal drinking fountains. Facilities have enhanced sanitation protocols, including hand sanitizing stations in each classroom. There will likely be a marked reduction in the number of non-school groups using school facilities.

School families have been asked to make plans for students who are ill to stay home. Families are encouraged to avoid recreational travel to and from states that have outbreaks identified by the CDC. Parents who travel to designated 'hotspots' identified by local health authorities are asked to avoid in-person visits to our schools. Families are also asked to commit to self-screening practices.

Adults and staff of our Lutheran schools intend to operate in good faith adherence to mask guidance issued by the state and local health authorities. Managing the particulars of that guidance will be a learning process. Our schools are places of grace, and we invite understanding as this takes place.

As we continue to address additional details related to keeping our children and staff safe during in-person lessons throughout this school year, please know that our schools are prepared to move to remote-only models as a contingency plan, should there be a compelling immediate health crisis.

Any decisions made by our Lutheran schools are always intended with the best interests of staff, students and families in mind. We all remain committed to equipping the next generation of Christ-like servant leaders!

Early Childhood Workshop





CFLC Recommends: The Lutheran Study Bible

The month of August brings a new school year, and with that, new routines. A great routine to start this month is being in God's Word both individually and as a family. One great resource to help you with being in God's Word daily is the Bible, specifically *The Lutheran Study Bible* (ESV), published by Concordia Publishing House. *The Lutheran Study Bible* is the first Bible in English with distinctly Lutheran notes.

The Lutheran Study Bible includes a helpful section entitled, "How to Read and Study the Bible." It also includes a two-year reading plan that has you reading a couple chapters of the Bible six days a week. This is a great way to kick-start getting yourself into the Word. For further study and devotion there are also notes and prayers throughout the Bible. Reading the lessons for the Sunday coming up is a great way to



be prepared for church, and this Bible also includes the one-year and three-year lectionary plans. In the front of the Bible you will find colored maps from Bible times. Throughout the rest of the Bible there are other maps for your reference. The beginning of each book has an introduction that includes an overview, some background, challenges for readers, blessings for readers, and an outline. This Bible is full of commentary to help Christians at any point in their faith journey become more mature.

How can you use all of this with your family? Another bright spot in *The Lutheran Study Bible* is that the entire Small Catechism is included at the front. Luther wrote the Small Catechism in simple words so parents could teach it to their children. Focus on a little bit of the Catechism each day. You can also use a children's Bible to study alongside *The Lutheran Study Bible*. Arch Books are another great resource to teach the Bible to your children. As teachers of the faith, we will never be perfect in our biblical knowledge or presentation, but the Spirit will give us just what we need to instruct our children in the ways of the Lord. He is faithful and He will do it!

Lutheran Early Response Team (LERT) News

While it seems like most folks and/or organizations are treading water waiting for COVID-19 to pass, your Disaster Response office in St. Louis has continued to work, develop and adapt. Some of their projects include:

- Writing and rewriting LERT curriculum, specifically chainsaw training material;
- Developing and sharing policies regarding youth as LERT volunteers; and
- Searching for reliable software to track volunteers.

In the midst of all of this work, there have been some changes with the staff, namely the addition of Rev. Robert Wurst as volunteer manager. I'd like to introduce the three individuals in the Disaster Response office in St. Louis so you know who they are and what they do.



The Rev. Ross E. Johnson was installed as director of LCMS Disaster Response in 2013. Rev. Johnson oversees the church's comprehensive Disaster Response program, including planning, training and implementing immediate and long-term responses to help people in the aftermath of disastrous events wherever they occur.



The Rev. Michael Meyer began serving as manager of LCMS Disaster Response in 2013; he now holds the position of director of Disaster Response training. Among Meyer's responsibilities are oversight of the LCMS District Disaster Response Program, in which he works with volunteer District Disaster Response Coordinators (DDRCs) to ensure ongoing disaster readiness training and preparation among LCMS districts, congregations, international staff and partner churches worldwide.



The Rev. Robert Wurst Jr. recently joined the Disaster Response team as volunteer manager. LERT volunteers are organized at the district level and trained in many aspects of disaster response so that they can be rapidly deployed when disasters strike. Describing LERT's organizational structure, Wurst noted: "The LERT program is focused in our congregations so that we can help each other and our neighbors in close conjunction with Word and Sacrament ministry. It is Disaster Response's task to come alongside, give guidance and encouragement, and offer training and resources so that this can be done efficiently" (*Reporter* online, Feb. 5, 2020).
