West Africa News


Missionary Rev. Jacob Gaugert, theological educator in West and Central Africa, provides an interesting recap of his pandemic-year activities in his <u>April/May newsletter</u>. At the end of the newsletter, Rev. Gaugert shares his plans for the fall:

Lord willing, I will be back on the African continent in early September to attend the annual CAU meeting of the Francophone Union, which is to be held in Congo-Brazzaville. This will be a very important meeting for these church leaders as they give further consideration to their subscription to the Scriptures and the Lutheran Confessions and what that means for the practices of their churches in caring for the souls entrusted to their care. There will also be discussion and clarifications on the administrative aspect of their partnership among their own church bodies and with LCMS OIM (Office of International Mission). I ask for your prayers for these leaders as they will need to dedicate themselves to much prayer, study, and communication in preparation for this meeting so that the discussions and decisions that take place would be fruitful for the work of Christ in His Kingdom among them.

We pray that Rev. Gaugert has a safe return to Africa!

CFLC Recommends: 7 Practices of Healthy Youth Ministry

One year ago, we were well into the pandemic. One year from now, LCMS youth and adults will be gathering at the LCMS Youth Gathering in Houston, Texas. Whether your congregation plans to attend or not, it's critical that we all embrace the young people that our Lord has entrusted to us for care and keeping.

As the Children's and Family Life Committee begins a second round of resource recommendations focusing on ministry impact across the life span, I would like to recommend **7 Practices of Healthy Youth Ministry – An Introduction.** This timely article from LCMS Youth Ministry addresses how congregations might proactively address post-youth confirmation ministry or teaching in their church's context as they support, direct, and inspire youth and their families today and into the future. A brief excerpt follows:

This is not a program. We will not present you with a curriculum, schedule, or plan of events. There is no single right path to produce healthy youth ministry. Instead, the focus is on relationships: God's relationship with us, parents' relationships with their children, the congregational relationship to youth, and the youth's relationship with key adults. We believe that when you seek to build and sustain Christ centered relationships, the right programs for your congregation will become clear.

LERT Tornado Response Selden, KS

An EF1 tornado set down in the town of Selden, Kansas in the northwest part of the state on May 24, 2021. Most of the damage was in the downtown area, but several homes were affected as well. Once again, Bob Warfel (Messiah, Hays) traveled to Selden with Pastor Schmidt to assess the damage and offer assistance. The residents and city officials had already begun the cleanup process and felt that they were equipped to take care of the required work. Thank you, Pastor Michael Schmidt, for traveling with Bob to assess the needs in Selden.

Wind damage in Garnett, KS | June 11, 2021

A powerful storm moved through north central to eastern Kansas, snapping power poles, uprooting and damaging trees, and leaving thousands without power. Our call came from the emergency manager in Anderson County. The NE LERT team responded on June 12, 2021, with chainsaws, working on three properties. Focus on Mental Health: "Truth Be Told"

The article below, written by Principal Sharon Fries of Bethany, Overland Park, showcases a positive step toward the goal of encouraging Kansas District members "to provide Christ-centered, compassionate care to those with mental illnesses and disorders (Convention Resolution 18-02-05).

Matthew West sings a song titled *Truth be Told*. It is worth every bit of the 3:47 it takes to listen to it. I think lie number one ("You're supposed to have it all together") is believed by church workers everywhere, and lie number two ("Everybody's life is perfect except yours") is the story of so many of our youth today. Seriously, you should stop reading right now and <u>listen to the song</u>, then come back.

I have two principals that are my go-to people in the "principal world." Mentors and models in every sense of the word:

- Mr. Brueggemann (Mr. B) was the principal who started Hope Lutheran School in Shawnee in 1983. Milt was an amazing man, and loved by many. I knew him well. He was my youth group leader in high school, my boss when I ran the after-care program at Hope, and someone I talked with a lot during my first 10 years of teaching. What I wouldn't give to talk to him again! Milt passed away from lung disease just a few years after we started our school at Bethany, Overland Park, where I currently serve as principal. His dying wish is that we all continue to tell the kids that Jesus loves them.
- Steve Vandemark was the principal at Christ Lutheran School in Overland Park for several years and also spent many years in local public schools in the area. We've been friends since high school and rarely went more than a day or two without texting about something. He was a tremendous leader, great coach, and my go-to friend in so many ways - principal world and otherwise.

Neither of these principals made it out of their 50s. Lives cut way too short. Two men missed daily by so many people.

On Friday afternoon, September 25, 2020, Steve took his own life. He suffered from mental illness and depression in a way that very few people knew about. He didn't feel he could tell anyone, so he didn't. The first time I heard the *Truth Be Told* song was at his funeral, and it's one of the most powerful services that I have ever attended. That song is Steve's story. We just can't have any more funerals like that.

Some good has to come from this. That is what is happening with a program called *Truth be Told*, started in honor of Milt and Steve, at Bethany. Leaders of this program are focused on the ministry of mental health. Time is spent intentionally talking with each other, getting to know each other, and helping mental health be more understood and accepted, rather than something to avoid. Middle school students eat lunch together and are guided in intentional conversation about how everyone is doing and feeling, how we can help each other, and current events in their lives. In June 2021, the first annual *Truth Be Told* Basketball Camp hosted 40 middle school students for a few days of fun, basketball, and conversations. Biblical reminders were presented on how we can help and support each other.

In front of Bethany Lutheran Church and School is a tree, planted in memory of Mr. B and Mr. V. It's our *Truth Be Told* tree, with an engraved reminder at the base of the tree of the wonderful ministry begun by these two men, and now continued by those impacted by their lives. Mental health is so important. While not as obvious as a broken bone or cancer, it needs the same attention and care. The *Truth Be Told* program is just beginning. Please pray that as it grows, it will continue to help this current generation make a radical difference in the lives of those around them and in the world of mental health.

District Awards \$43K+ in Scholarships

The District's Scholarship Committee is pleased to announce that \$43,500 in scholarships have been awarded this year to two freshmen, four juniors, four seniors, one deaconess and nine seminarians! Students are eligible for general scholarships if they are pursuing a degree in church work at an LCMS college or seminary. Congratulations, 2021/2022 scholarship recipients!

Now Accepting Education Loan Repayment Grant Applications

The LCMS Kansas District provides grants to rostered church workers to help them repay college and/or seminary education loans. All rostered Synod graduates, as well as those who have completed the colloquy program, who are currently working in the Kansas District are eligible for the first 10 years after graduation or ordination to apply for this grant.

The 2021 grant application is now available on our website. You can access the form under the "Quick Links" on the https://doi.org/10.2016/journal.org/ or on our qrants and scholarships page.

The application deadline is August 31, 2021. Applications should be sent to the attention of Heather Williams at the District Office, 1000 SW 10th Ave., Topeka, KS, 66604 or via email at heather@kslcms.org. Grants applications will be reviewed and awards announced by the end of September.

The policy of the LCMS Kansas District is for education loan grants to be applied to educational debt that rostered workers have incurred, whether in the form of federally subsidized loans, commercial loans or even credit card debt for books needed to enter ministry. The grant is awarded to help reduce total indebtedness, not to make payments in advance or to reduce the amount of currently scheduled payments.

CPS Student Loan Debt Virtual Workshop


