e need pastors," the young man from Africa said to me. I had just asked him what the greatest need was for the church in West Africa.

We often talk about the need for pastors here in America, especially with the significant number of pastors who are retiring over the next few years. This is an important issue we face, and that's why I thank God for our Synod's church worker recruitment initiative, Set Apart to Serve. (Check it out at lcms.org/sas.)

We have important work to do when it comes to raising up pastors and other church workers for the LCMS.

As the young man from Africa told me, training and pastoral leaders are greatly needed for the church in Africa. He identified this as the *greatest* need in West Africa. So, brothers and sisters in

Christ, do what Jesus says in Luke 10. Pray! Pray that the Lord would send workers into His harvest field, not only here in America, but also in West and Central Africa.

As you probably know, that is an area of the world that we in the Kansas District have been working in for quite a while. It's actually been 25 years since we began a partnership with the Synod to support mission work in Guinea! We're going to celebrate this milestone anniversary at our district convention in June.

After 25 years of work in the region, we now have the opportunity to participate in a special project that will help provide and prepare workers for God's harvest in Guinea. The Evangelical Lutheran Church in Guinea (ELCG) is looking to build a seminary.

from John Wolf, who serves as Africa region project manager for LCMS International Mission:

"In 2017, the love for the Gospel has led the ELCG to use a borrowed church building to start a local training center. Now they are preparing to procure land and establish a dedicated facility to allow more Guinean men to complete their pastoral training program in what is now CLET-Guinea (Centre Luthérien d'Études Théologiques).

"The complex is planned to include two main buildings. One will include a classroom, a library (stock and reading room) and a storage closet. The other will include two offices, a meeting room and a refectory. The funds from this project will be used to purchase the area and the industrial equipment for the site, such as cement, steel, concrete, sheet metal, tie wire, spikes, electrification equipment, plumbing equipment, paint, skilled labor and transportation of this equipment to the job site. The ELCG already plans to contribute labor and food, as well as obtain aggregates needed for construction (sand, gravel, stone blocks)."

Your prayers are needed for this project. In addition to prayers, I'm asking you to consider giving financially to help raise up workers for the harvest field in Guinea. Our West Africa Committee has set a goal to raise \$25,000 for this effort through our annual Kansas District Pentecost Offering. I think we can meet and exceed this goal. If we do, we may well be able to provide the rest of the financing needed to make this project a reality. This will provide a lasting, generational impact on the mission work done in Guinea and the surrounding area in West Africa.

Please join me in praying for workers for God's harvest field in America and in Guinea. And let's help the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Guinea build their seminary!

We pray: Lord of the harvest, You invite us to ask You to send workers into the harvest field according to Your gracious will. Grant pastors, O Lord, for our congregations in Kansas and for the people of Guinea who are made faithful through the study of Your Word. Give us generous hearts to support the building of the seminary in Guinea. And bless Your servants with bold and winsome speech to proclaim Your excellencies to those near and far, that Your Kingdom be extended and Your name glorified; through Jesus Christ, our Lord.
