

Getting Started: Service Opportunities

In earlier articles we have written about Older Adults getting together for Spiritual Enrichment, through Bible study and events tailored around scriptural study. We have talked about making older adult get-togethers fun. We termed this as "Food, Fellowship, and Fun." Another wonderful way to bring Older Adults together is through service projects. When considering a service project there are several goals Important to reach.

I believe it is always important to consider first if the project is pleasing to God. This may seem obvious, but why we serve is more important than what we do or keeping score as to how much we did. When asked about the greatest commandment, Jesus answered that we are commanded to love God and our neighbor as ourselves. Service projects are not a contest to see who can do the most. Likewise, they are not about showing the world how wonderful we are. It is about helping our neighbor. I have found that Older Adults are very willing to help in projects that show God's love to others.

I consider who is receiving help from what is done. Is there a great need for school supplies? Then beginning a supply day at church could be helpful. Are the food pantries running low? Try a food drive. Is your church in need of repairs and upgrading of the facilities? Why not a workday? Make sure there is a real need for your church or community before deciding on a project.

Nothing puts a damper on a well-meaning service project than one that is not well organized. Get a group of people to figure out the date and place, gather the items needed to carry out your project, and communicate to your intended volunteers what is needed from them. Remember not to grade your project on the number of items collected or the number of volunteers. If God blesses your actions, that is the only sign of success you need.

Once the project has been completed, take time to reflect on what was done, what went well, and how you might do things differently the next time. Then start planning a new project down the road. Here is a short list of some of the service projects we have tried.

Saints Alive After 55, 2022, is now behind us and what a wonderful event it was! We were blessed to have two outstanding speakers that led us through a greater understanding of what it is to "Rejoice always!" and gave us much food for thought as we consider the choices we older adults need to make in the years to come.

Pastor Dan Myers, our Bible study leader, zeroed in on our theme verse, "Rejoice Always!" taken from 1 Thessalonians 5:16-24, and challenged us to consider "Mission Im-possible or Him-possible." His remarks centered around three points - rejoice always; pray constantly; and give thanks in everything. We learned the difference between worldly joy and Biblical joy and how happiness and joy are not the same. Session two focused on prayer: what it is and what it is not and how important prayer is in our daily lives. His last session led us to understand the significant difference between "FOR everything" and "IN everything" give thanks.

Mark Schoepp, our guest speaker, had us thinking about all of the important decisions that need to be made in our later years. He touched on many subjects, such as when we might need to move from our homes to a care facility or how to age gracefully in our own homes. He talked about making critical medical decisions early on, having a current will in place, and making our wishes known for our funeral, to name a few.

Monday evening was spent getting to know one another with a matching game that had us laughing and learning more about our friends at the event. Butch Amey led us in fun songs throughout the two days with the help of his guitar and ukulele—most enjoyable!

Our interest sessions were presented by Jim Bradshaw and Donna Williams. Jim gave a brief history of the KS District Older Adult Committee, how it came to be, and its primary purpose in continuing to include our older adults in our congregations' ministries. Donna spoke about the important work the Lutheran Early Response Team does when disaster strikes. A recent example of the care shown to those in need was sending 13 Lutheran comfort dogs to Uvalde, Texas, after the school shooting.

Another enjoyable aspect of our time together was the delicious food we were served at each meal. Those cooks certainly know how to please their visitors!

With another Saints Alive event behind us, we are looking to the future and beginning to plan for 2023. We will be making some changes, since we no longer have the option to stay at the Spiritual Life Center, but I am sure we will find a new venue and will be able to gather again to worship, learn, sing, and enjoy one another's company.
