We learned that of the 35 LCMS Districts in the US, we have 27 representatives who cover those districts. We began the day with a communion worship service in the chapel on the campus of Concordia University Wisconsin. The Blessings of the Hands service followed, committing to the work that God has called us to do. The dedication service was lead by Rev. Joe Cottam, the Pastoral Advisor.

Our daylong gathering included a presentation by Rev. Kevin Voss, professor of Bioethics at the University. His discussion was "Troubling Beginning and End-of-Life Issues". He especially focused on the various forms of abortion, what the Bible says about the topic (Exodus 20:13) the 5<sup>th</sup> commandment, "Thou shall not kill". #### Reclaiming the Joy of a Church Vocation

At the District Representative meeting prior to the Parish Nurses Conference on the campus of Concordia University Wisconsin, we reviewed the book written by Darrell Zimmerman. He is also the author of "Reclaiming the Joy of Ministry". The current book focuses on the called, non-ordained parish professional to discover the new possibilities for a long, joyful and fruitful ministry career.

Church work is demanding and stressful but can be very joyful and fulfilling. The book is based on the "Wellness Wheel" with your baptism in the center of all we do. Darrell reviewed the events in Elijah's life (1 Kings 19). Satan tried to convince Elijah that he could not carry on the work of God. Elijah tried to run away, but God was with him. God protected him on his journey and renewed his strength just as God does for us who have been called into his ministry. Although Parish Nurses are not called servants by the church as teachers, musicians, Deacons, Deaconess or Director of Christian Education, we are called to do his will, using our education, skills and compassion to care for those God has placed before us. The gifts that we have carry us through, giving us glimpses of joy that gives us the strength to carry on.

Darrell tells the reader that there are hardships, some time there is no joy, but that is the devil trying to

convince us to follow him and not carry on, to experience the joy of the work that God has planned for us. Balancing the life, our families, and our church can be difficult. ### Parish Nurse Conference Highlights Compassionate Service

The PN Conference "Compassionate Service" (Colossians 3:12) began on Wednesday morning with a worship service. The first speakers were Bill Meier and Rodd Rosenthal representing the MEROS Center. The center is a research and training community for Christian Health Ministry. As an extension of parish nursing, community health ministry moves upstream to promote health and meet communities where they are in their journey of understanding their story in God's grand plan. Carman Stephens (formerly of Wichita) presented "Reflecting on Joy-Filled Self Care". Using the letters JOY: Jesus; Others; Yourself, she discussed the storm in Luke 8, our storm is life – we are to rest in Jesus, take care of others and perform good self care.

Deaconess Dr. Tiffany Manor, the Managing Director of LCMS Office of National Mission Human Care and Ministerial Support and Director of LCMS Life Ministry discussed mental health issues and the concerns as it continues to increase. The serious need for outreach to those struggling with mental illnesses and their families so they may receive the good news of Jesus. Parish Nursing ministry can play an important role is ministering to those individuals.

We learned from Karen Tripp, Executive Director and Founder of Cancer Companions, who discussed increasing the quality of care and decreasing stress by serving others who are diagnosed with cancer. Rev. Dan Paavola concluded the day with "Some-Day Jeans: Fitting into God's Plan". His presentation overview read "everyone has some-day jeans, clothes that we plan to wear again someday. Maybe we will, maybe not, but they are still in our closet. How do we fit in the plans of God for us today and tomorrow?

Good news – we fit his grace, love, and forgiveness already. It's a perfect fit. But he also has plans for our future. He plans on us growing, not shrinking, into the gifts and talents he has given us." Rev. Paavola uses intriguing object lessons to share God's word.

Thursday, one of the 18 breakout sessions included a discussion by Barb Schroeder MS, PN, Grief Coach on Gratitude. How can we show gratitude to others? One example was using the alphabet, at the birthday of a child or a grandchild, identifying words of why you are grateful for the child. She shared several handouts of ways to show gratitude.

Carmen Stephens (formerly of Wichita) discussed "Fall Prevention and Healthy Aging". Falls can prevent an older adult from remaining independent. Taking a few precautions will help the older person remain in their home longer. <a href="CDC.gov/steadi">CDC.gov/steadi</a> has many resources with statistics, training and education to help reduce fall risks which can be shared with members.

Karen Tripp presented a breakout session "Simple, Effective Ways to Serve Long-term Patients and Caregivers." Her overview of the presentation "The longer an illness lasts, the easier it is for patients and caregivers to become isolated". As parish nurses, we can help identify needs and assist to see the burdens that the patient and the primary caregiver are going through, increase awareness of the secondary caregivers, and help identify needs and avenues to fill needs. Some of the needs might be everyday tasks of mowing the lawn, cleaning a litter box or car repairs. Carol Lueders-Bolwerk, Brenda Jobe, and John Dyson's presentation was titled, "Perceptions of Being Called to Nursing". The research they performed focused on how nurses feel about their calling and perception of vocation in nursing as they serve patients, church members and others in mind, body, and spirit. The research of the trio used a sample size of 578 RNs and nursing students; most all of whom felt a calling to nursing. Using the verse noted several places in scripture "Here I am". (Isaiah 6:8, 1 Samuel 3:4, and Luke 1:38).

It was interesting to hear the history of nursing, how Florence Nightingale was called into the field of nursing by helping the wounded soldiers and how she reduced the infection rates in the hospitals in England. "The Days That Were Formed for Me" was the topic of discussion by Deaconess Dr. Tiffany Manor, the Director of LCMS Life Ministry. Suicidal thoughts is a time when we can care for each other as mental

illness is very prevalent in our society. Tiffany shared that Christ desires us to care for each other, bear one another's burdens to the end of earthly life, the day of natural death. To be there for each other through the emotional suffering that people experience in the world today.

### Parish Nursing at Holy Cross Lutheran Church, Wichita Kansas

Parish Nursing or Parish Health, as we call it now, started at Holy Cross Lutheran Church (HCL) around 1999 – 2000 with the direction of our pastors. At that time St Francis Regional Medical Center began a program to help prepare nurses to assist their congregations in promoting physical and spiritual health. They called it Parish nursing. JoVeta Westcott RN was in charge of the program. One of the nurses in our congregation worked with her in that program, and so our journey began.

It was in the early years, a health cabinet was initiated to help evaluate the needs of our congregation and guided us how to proceed. We started simple, as most programs did, with taking blood pressures once a month after the first service. Hoping that having the blood pressure checks at this time we would be able to see the most people. We expanded to having health fairs, which included physical, spiritual and emotional components. Holy Cross is so blessed to have a school that starts with preschool and ends at 8<sup>th</sup> grade. We were able to assist with the school with hearing and sight tests.

As it goes with a lot of programs the activities seemed to slow down. We were down to a few people that would take blood pressures monthly. In 2010 it was decided that we needed to reorganize and try to get Parish Health revitalized.

Again we started at the beginning and reassessed the needs of our congregation to see how we could help. We were able to recruit more nurses. We did a few traditional health fairs and programs for the congregation that were both educational and fun. We did the "Walk to Jerusalem/ Bethlehem" and "Walk Kansas" to encourage exercise. We began to do blood drives with the American Red Cross, honor nurses and health care workers on St. Luke's Sunday, and had a few one hour CEU program for Nurses. 2 AEDS were acquired and Parish Health checks them on a monthly basis to be sure they are ready if needed. Beginning

in 2019 Holy Cross began a biannual event, Let Freedom Sing. It is usually on the weekend before the  $4^{th}$  of July. The parish health committee has a first aid tent at the event.

Once again the number of nurses that were willing to help decreased and there were 2 of us trying to keep all the balls in the air so some activities had to be dropped. Than it was the COVID Pandemic and sadly things came to a halt.

Today we do not have an organized group to continue as we once did, as Marna Atkinson and I have other personal and family commitments. We are hoping to find someone who is willing to take on the reigns. Marna and I continue to schedule blood drives, maintain the AEDS, and help out as needed. The pastors are very supportive of the Parish Nurse Ministry.

As most everyone knows it is hard to find willing workers these days. I pray that one day we can have an active parish health ministry at Holy Cross Lutheran Church in Wichita.

#### Parish Nurse Education

Concordia University Wisconsin offers a Parish Nursing/Faith Community Nursing course earning a certificate of completion. The distant learning, 8-week course is taught by the Schools of Nursing and Theology. This course is available to registered nurses. LCMS Parish Nurse Council offers a 17-module course. In collaboration with the Lutheran Nurses Association of Australia. The schedule is flexible and it is encouraged to be completed within six months. Many complete the course in less than six months. The course was developed by practicing clergy and parish nurses and reviewed for parish nurses within LCMS. The course is designed for the RN as an introduction to parish nursing, but it can be adapted to others within the health professions wishing to serve as congregational health advocates. Personalized mentoring is provided throughout the courses and periodic optional zoom meetings are provided to add the group discussion component.
