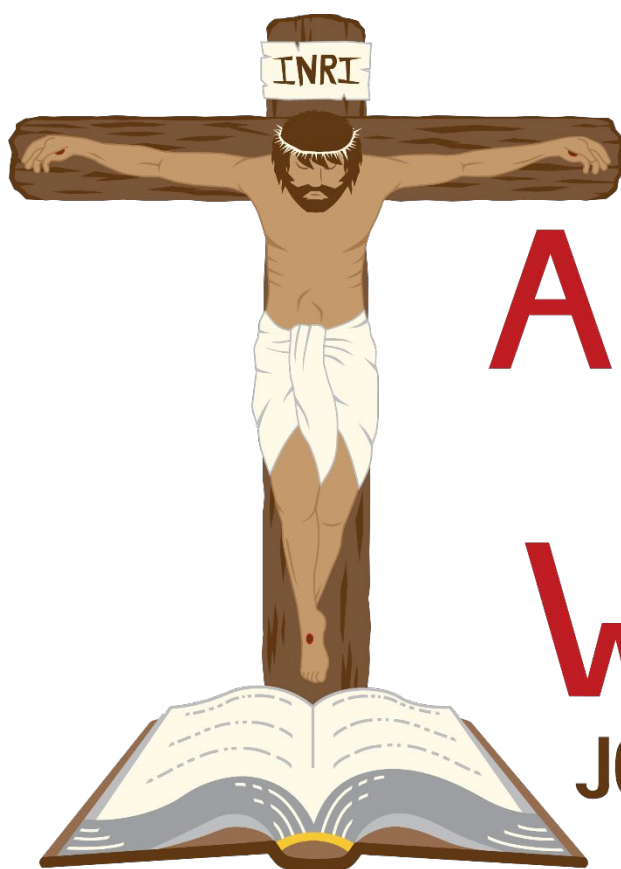

PASTORS KEYNOTE SPEAKER



Rev. Dr. Joel D. Biermann

A full-time member of the faculty at Concordia Seminary since 2002, Rev. Dr. Joel Biermann revels in teaching doctrinal theology to Concordia's students – and to anyone else he can persuade to listen. He was ordained in 1987 and spent eleven years as a parish pastor serving congregations in Minnesota and Michigan before returning to the seminary for graduate work. He and his wife, Jeannalee, enjoy spending time pursuing a variety of activities afforded by the city, but most especially they cherish time with their three children and their spouses and their eleven grandchildren all who live in the St. Louis area. He has authored four books: *Courageous Fathers of the Bible*; *A Case for Character*; *Wholly Citizens*, and *Day 7*.

Abiding in the Word as Workers in the Kingdom

Keynote I – “Abiding without Mystifying”

While “abide” drags with it ideas and feelings that lean in the spiritual and mystical direction, it's actually quite a concrete verb. Joined with a concrete understanding of threefold nature of the Word, abiding in the Word captures the heart of Christian confession.

Keynote II – “Remaining and Running”

When things “remain” they tend not to move. It is vital that Christians rightly understand the relationship between passivity and activity in their lives, overcome the false divide between them, and learn to see abiding as something far from static.

Keynote III – “Working with the Word”

We are prone to set aside precious and special things, “saving” them for appropriate occasions or circumstances. God's Word is as precious, special, and holy as it gets, but it is meant to do work. Indeed, it is the only tool kingdom-workers have got.

Keynote IV – “Watch Your Language”

Christians confess Jesus as their Lord—but learning to speak the Christian language takes practice, and we are prone to pick up other dialects. To follow Christ means that we speak his language, so we need to pay attention to rules of Christian grammar and not become fluent in American pidgin Christian speech.

EDUCATORS KEYNOTE SPEAKER



Rev. Dr. Peter Jurchen

Rev. Dr. Pete Jurchen is the Asst. Professor of Lutheran Education and Faith Formation at Concordia University, Nebraska. In this role he teaches classes both related to Lutheran education for future church workers and helps lead initiatives that help cultivate a campus community that is actively engaged in faith formation. He lives in Seward, Nebraska with his wonderful wife Deb and their five children.

Keeping In Focus: Insights from the Lutheran Tradition that Helps Us Equip and Cultivate Mature Disciples

Overall, the three parts of this presentation will use a mental picture/framework to help us think about how we equip each other with the tools of self-directed, lifelong learning of God's Word. The frame is a magnifying glass, which consists of three parts: the handle, the frame, and the lens.

Keynote I – “The Handle”

Values of the Lutheran Tradition that Support Lifelong Learning of God's Word. I will talk about different values/attitudes from the Lutheran tradition that we can build and emphasize in our lives and our schools that keep us motivated and empowered to be people of the Word of God.

Keynote II – “The Frame”

Practices from the Lutheran Tradition that Support Lifelong Learning of God's Word. I will focus on both the corporate and individual practices from the Lutheran tradition that anyone (Lutheran or not) can utilize that will form the habit of self-directed lifelong learning of God's Word.

Keynote III – “The Lens”

Insights from the Lutheran Tradition that Support a Growing Understanding of the Intersection of God's Word and Daily Life. In this session I will focus on six key Reformation tensions (humanity, suffering, love, purpose, freedom, and reason) that we can keep in mind (and help instill in others) when we are seeking to interpret the world through a Biblical lens.

Rev. Daniel Grams

Rev. Daniel Grams has served the LCMS Kansas District since October 2023 as the Assistant to the President for Congregational & School Services. In this role, he supports and encourages congregations and church workers in the areas of missions, stewardship, education, and youth ministry. Prior to his service in Kansas, Rev. Grams spent 21 years as a parish pastor, serving congregations in diverse settings: an urban parish in New Jersey, a rural congregation with a school in Wisconsin, and a suburban church with an early childhood center in Michigan.

He holds a B.A. from Concordia University–Ann Arbor, an M.Div. from Concordia Theological Seminary–Fort Wayne, and a Master of Nonprofit Administration from the Mendoza College of Business at the University of Notre Dame–South Bend. Rev. Grams has contributed to the broader church through roles such as LCMS Convention Delegate, Floor Committee member, Circuit Visitor, Chair of the English District Constitutions Committee, and as a member of both the SELC outreach and English District evangelization committees. Rev. Grams has traveled several times to South Sudan with Lutheran Heritage Foundation to teach men preparing for pastoral ministry with the Ev. Lutheran Church of South Sudan & Sudan. In the community, Rev. Grams has served as a fire department chaplain and as a board member and volunteer for a local food pantry and Care Net Pregnancy Center.

Rev. Grams and his wife Susan, a rostered LCMS teacher, have been married for over 27 years and are blessed with four children: Mitchell, Katherine, Nicholas, and Nathan.

Rev. Dr. Jamison Hardy

The Rev. Dr. Jamison Hardy is the President of the Concordia University System. He was born in Bay City and raised in Flint and Westland, Michigan. Following High School, Jamison continued his Lutheran education at Concordia University in Mequon, WI where he pursued a degree in Secondary Education-Broad Field Social Sciences. Upon graduating, Jamison enrolled at Concordia Seminary in Fort Wayne, IN. He was ordained on December 10, 2000, at St. Matthew's Lutheran Church in Westland, MI, and called to Our Savior Lutheran Church in Mt. Lebanon, Pennsylvania. In 2007-2008, Our Savior Lutheran Church in Mt. Lebanon, PA, and Hope Lutheran Church in McMurray, PA, merged into Peace Lutheran Church with Pastor Hardy as the pastor of the merged congregation meeting at the McMurray location, after teaching as an adjunct at the Community College of Allegheny County. Pastor Hardy began his graduate studies in 2009 in the Master's in Public Policy program. He then continued with his doctorate in Business Administration from Walden University in Minneapolis, graduating in 2012. In 2009, he was elected as the vice-president of the English District of the LCMS. He also served on the Peters Township School Board of Directors and the McMurray Rotary Club #7330.

In June 2015, Pastor Hardy was elected as the 21st President and Bishop of the English District of the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod at its 55th regular convention. Bishop Hardy taught classes at Concordia Theological Seminary in the Doctor of Ministry program on parish administration and pastoral leadership. He also recorded the PALS module for the LCMS on the same topic. He has presented at several conferences and led workshops on the works of mercy, emphasizing faith and love. Bishop Hardy was awarded the Distinguished Alumnus Award from Concordia University, Mequon, WI in May 2021. In October of the same year, he was inducted into the Athletic Hall of Fame for wrestling at Concordia University, Mequon, WI.

In May 2024, the Concordia University System (CUS) extended a divine call to Dr. Hardy to serve as its next president, and after prayerful consideration, he accepted it. Under Dr. Hardy's leadership, CUS has established protocols for visiting all CUS campuses and supporting them in fulfilling their mission and objectives. CUS has launched its Church-Work voucher program. He continues to serve in the pastoral ministry as an Associate Pastor at Our Savior, Hartland, MI. He and his wife, Wendy, have three children.

Description: Benedict of Nursia fundamentally altered western civilization as we know it. Out of the ashes of a decrepit society, the Holy Spirit forged the Western world through Benedict. Built upon the foundations of prayer, work, and study, Benedict of Nursia was a true reformer 1,000 years before Luther tasted sauerkraut. Is there anything we can learn or even appropriate from him? We will engage in a critical examination of the person, movement, and rule of Benedict of Nursia. Comparing these with the Holy Scriptures and Lutheran Confessions (namely AC XXVII), we will see if there is anything that can be learned or adopted in our context.

Session: A5

Title: Jesus and Bad Funeral Etiquette: A Reason for Hope

Presenter: Rev. Jacob Mueller

Description: Humans create etiquette to make ourselves feel comfortable in uncomfortable situations. This was just as true during Jesus' earthly ministry as it is today. While parts of our traditional funeral etiquette are helpful and should be retrained, Jesus did not follow the funeral etiquette of his day. This presentation will show us why Jesus' action at funerals is good news for you. This will help us as we share the message of hope with those who mourn today and help us imagine what etiquette could look like in the New Creation. Rev. Jacob T. Mueller is the pastor of Hope Lutheran Church and School, Shawnee, KS.
