"And he [Jesus] said to him, 'Truly, I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise.' "

(Luke 23:43)

These Last Sundays of the Church Year call us to reexamine ourselves. We have no clue when Christ will come again. Yes, there are signs pointing to His return, but as to an exact date, it is foolish for us to speculate.

While we do not know the exact time and date of Christ's return, we do know the ending to that story. God's promises will be fulfilled on the day of the final resurrection. One day Jesus will come back. Everything will come to an end. One second, we're eating a meal or driving a car or at work, and the next instant we will see Jesus in all His glory.

By faith, we know that on the Last Day those who have died will have their physical bodies rise and live again. On the Judgment Day, those who have believed in Christ as their Lord and Savior from sin will enter the glorious heavenly life forever, with body and soul reunited.

It's in Luke's Gospel where we read that just one criminal speaks against Jesus—and you can hear the contempt in his voice. He is defiant, angry, and sarcastic as he joins in with the mocking. But, in the midst of mockery, there is hope. It is hope found in the sudden reversal of the one criminal who receives paradise. The criminal is broken and asks for Jesus to remember him. He sees himself as the lost and condemned man he truly is.

Jesus answers the criminal's request by announcing the one true story for all to believe.

"Today you will be with me in paradise" (v. 43). Today—right now. What a glorious word for you and me! There is no such thing as a Roman Catholic purgatory or interim state that believers will end up hoping for others to purchase the rest of their eternal salvation. Where is the hope in that? Where is Christ? It makes His death completely insufficient.

God sent His Son Jesus to be the perfect, once-for-all sacrifice for our sins-past, present and future. **Hebrews 9:27-28**, "Just as it is appointed for man to die once, and after that comes judgment, so Christ, having been offered once to bear the sins of many, will appear a second time, not to deal with sin but to save those who are eagerly waiting for him."

Jesus came into this world to save sinners who are helpless, lost, and condemned. There are no exceptions—all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God.

Christ really matters. He is the only way to salvation. He has transferred us from the domain of darkness into His Kingdom of light. This is why we are faithful in every Sunday worship to hear his Word and receive His Sacrament, to be daily in devotion and prayer, and to be those spiritual priests who are reaching out to the lapsed and the lost, who are not yet known to Christ. Come soon, Lord Jesus!

Congratulations!

Redeemer Lutheran Mission, Lake Wabaunsee, was officially chartered as a congregation of the LCMS Kansas District on Sunday, October 12. Over 70 people were in attendance for the service.

Redeemer is part of the SPR Partnership with St. Paul's, Alta Vista and St. Paul's, Clark's Creek. They are served by Rev. John Fries. Soli Deo Gloria!

On October 11, Rev. Timothy Koch was invited to Concordia Seminary in St. Louis to lead a Jesus Door-2-Door (JD2D) event with some of the faculty and students. Rev. Matthew Clark and Ascension Lutheran

Church graciously served as hosts.

11 canvassing teams knocked on 351 houses and conducted 68 surveys. Two individuals expressed a desire for a follow-up visit from the church. Of the 68 surveys taken, when asked "Where do you believe you will go when you die?" 16 (23.5%) responded with a different answer than "Heaven." Of those who did respond with "Heaven," 13 (19%) were certain of their salvation because of what Jesus did for them.

Lutheran Early Response Team

"I'm a trained and credentialed LERT Volunteer: now what?" This is one of the top three questions we receive following a Basic Training event. During our training, we talk about how to respond to disasters, what to do, what to say, and how to keep safety a priority. We want to prepare you the best we can for these events that come without warning. However, what about the "off season," that time in between? How does your disaster response training tie into everyday life, including the church and communities in which we live? That, in itself, is the answer to the question. Some of our

best work is done within our congregations and communities in ALL seasons. Training received from your LERT facilitators has a natural progression into the Christ Care groups already functioning within your congregation. The better question is, "How do I use my LERT training to walk alongside other groups and organizations, perhaps in a support role, to enhance what is already being done?" There is also the option to create your own service events and/ or projects. Faith at Work (April 2026) is a great way to focus on these needs as a Christ-centered community, motivated by the love of

Christ. We have a brochure that outlines suggestions and talking points for you to consider when asking these questions. If you would like to have a copy, please contact Donna Williams.

Automatically Created GoFundMe Non-Profit Accounts

Recently, GoFundMe has begun automatically creating donation pages for non-profits using publicly available IRS data—without the organizations' direct consent. This development directly affects many non-profit organizations, including congregations, schools, and other ministries.

If your congregation or school appears on GoFundMe, please note:

- No action is required unless you wish to manage the page directly.
- ◆ Claiming a page allows your organization to link a bank account, control the content, view donor information, and ensure proper handling of gifts—but it also brings responsibilities for oversight, donor acknowledgment, and recordkeeping.
- ♦ Not claiming the page avoids these responsibilities, but it's wise to check the site occasionally to make sure your organization's name and information are used appropriately.
- GoFundMe's terms allow non-profits to request removal of an automatically created page if they do not wish to be listed.

You can search to see whether your church or school has a Go-FundMe page by visiting: https://www.gofundme.com/s? nonprofits=1. Many LCMS Kansas District ministries are listed here. While these pages may provide another way for supporters to give, the automatic setup can cause confusion or reputational risk if left unmanaged. We encourage you to check whether your ministry has a GoFundMe page and take action as appropriate.
